

1                                   **LEGISLATIVE AUDITS OF CHILD WELFARE**

2   2003 GENERAL SESSION

5 **This act modifies child welfare statutes. This act makes the annual legislative audit of**  
6 **child welfare cases optional rather than mandatory, eliminates the requirement that the**  
7 **audit address statutorily enumerated issues, and specifies who may initiate an audit. This**  
8 **act makes technical changes.**

9 This act affects sections of Utah Code Annotated 1953 as follows:

10 AMENDS:

11           **62A-4a-118**, as last amended by Chapter 140, Laws of Utah 2000

12 *Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:*

13           Section 1. Section **62A-4a-118** is amended to read:

14           **62A-4a-118. Annual review of child welfare referrals and cases by executive**  
15 **director -- Accountability to the Legislature -- Review by Legislative Auditor General.**

16           (1) The division shall use principles of quality management systems, including  
17 statistical measures of processes of service, and the routine reporting of performance data to  
18 employees.

19           (2) (a) In addition to development of quantifiable outcome measures and performance  
20 measures in accordance with Section 62A-4a-117, the executive director, or his designee, shall  
21 annually review a randomly selected sample of child welfare referrals to and cases handled by  
22 the division. The purpose of that review shall be to assess whether the division is adequately  
23 protecting children and providing appropriate services to families, in accordance with the  
24 provisions of Title 62A, Chapter 4a, Child and Family Services, and Title 78, Chapter 3a, Part  
25 3, Abuse, Neglect, and Dependency Proceedings, and Part 4, Termination of Parental Rights  
26 Act. The review shall focus directly on the outcome of cases to children and families, and not  
27 simply on procedural compliance with specified criteria.



28 (b) The executive director shall report, regarding his review of those cases, to the  
29 Legislative Auditor General, the Child Welfare Legislative Oversight Panel, and the Health and  
30 Human Services Interim Committee each year, on dates scheduled by the panel and committee.

31 (c) Information obtained as a result of the review shall be provided to caseworkers,  
32 supervisors, and division personnel involved in the respective cases, for purposes of education,  
33 training, and performance evaluation.

34 (3) The executive director's review and report to the Legislature shall include:

35 (a) the criteria used by the executive director, or his designee, in making the  
36 evaluation;

37 (b) findings regarding whether state statutes, division policy, and legislative policy  
38 were followed in each sample case;

39 (c) findings regarding whether, in each sample case, referrals, removals, or cases were  
40 appropriately handled by the division and its employees, and whether children were adequately  
41 and appropriately protected and appropriate services provided to families, in accordance with  
42 the provisions of Title 62A, Chapter 4a, ~~[and]~~ Child and Family Services, Title 78, Chapter 3a,  
43 ~~[Parts 3 and 4]~~ Part 3, Abuse, Neglect, and Dependency Proceedings, and Part 4, Termination  
44 of Parental Rights Act, and division policy;

45 (d) an assessment of the division's intake procedures and decisions, including an  
46 assessment of the appropriateness of decisions not to accept referrals; and

47 (e) an assessment of the appropriateness of the division's assignment of priority.

48 (4) (a) In addition to the review conducted by the executive director, the Legislative  
49 Auditor General ~~[shall]~~ may annually audit a sample of child welfare referrals to and cases  
50 handled by the division~~[-]~~ and report his findings to the Child Welfare Legislative Oversight  
51 Panel and the Health and Human Services Interim Committee ~~[each year,]~~ on dates scheduled  
52 by the panel and committee.

53 (b) With regard to the sample of referrals, removals, and cases, the Legislative Auditor  
54 General's report ~~[shall]~~ may include:

55 (i) findings regarding whether state statutes, division policy, and legislative policy were  
56 followed by the division and its employees;

57 (ii) a determination regarding whether referrals, removals, and cases were appropriately  
58 handled by the division and its employees, and whether children were adequately and

59 appropriately protected and appropriate services provided for families, in accordance with the  
60 provisions of Title 62A, Chapter 4a, [~~and~~] Child and Family Services, Title 78, Chapter 3a,  
61 [~~Parts 3 and 4~~] Part 3, Abuse, Neglect, and Dependency Proceedings, and Part 4, Termination  
62 of Parental Rights Act, and division policy;

63 (iii) an assessment of the division's intake procedures and decisions, including an  
64 assessment of the appropriateness of decisions not to accept referrals;

65 (iv) an assessment of the appropriateness of the division's assignment of priority; and

66 (v) a determination regarding whether the department's review process is effecting  
67 beneficial change within the division and accomplishing the mission established by the  
68 Legislature and the department for that review process.

69 (c) An audit under this Subsection (4) may be initiated by:

70 (i) the Audit Subcommittee of the Legislative Management Committee;

71 (ii) the Child Welfare Legislative Oversight Panel; or

72 (iii) the Legislative Auditor General, following a review of the executive director's  
73 review under Subsection (2).
